1991

George Bush is President

Colin Powell and Dick Cheney are by his side

Saddam Hussein in power in Iraq, a brutal tyrant but a recent ally of the U.S. in the Iran-Iraq War

The U.S. bombs Iraq for 43 days

Comprehensive sanctions imposed in August 1990 cut off trade with Iraq. All oil sales are prohibited and only food and medicine can be bought

Thousands died from the bombing and the ground war

Iraq's currency, once at \$3 to the dinar, begins to slide

Everyone in Iraq has free health care and education

Iraq is a highly industrialized country

Iraq has an infant mortality rate of about 65 children per 1000 births

The U.S. has no clear energy policy, leading to a dependence on oil and a military strategy to maintain control of oil

George Bush sets Martin Luther King's birthday, Jan. 15, as a deadline for Iraq to leave Kuwait. Bombing begins on January 16

Thousands of people protested in Portland because they opposed the war

2001

George W Bush is President-Elect

Colin Powell and Dick Cheney are by his side

Saddam Hussein in power in Iraq, a hero to much of the Arab world for standing up to the U.S.

The US bombs Iraq about once every 3-7 days on average (since December 1998)

The sanctions remain the most comprehensive in history, but France, Russia, and scores of other nations begin sending flights to Iraq as the sanctions regime begins to crumble. The "oil-forfood" program, instituted in 1996, has lost two of its directors who resigned over its inadequacy.

UNICEF and others estimate over half a million children under age 5 have died from sanctions; AFP news reports over 300 have died in the "no-fly zone" bombings (nearly all deaths during Clinton's presidency)

Iraq's currency, now 1500 dinars to the dollar, is making a slow recovery

Education and health care sometimes require minimal payments, which can be extraordinary to the average Iraqi (with a salary of about \$ 3 a month)

Almost all of Iraq's industry is in shambles, with water, sewage and electrical plants having been bombed in the "Gulf War"

Iraq's infant mortality rate has doubled to 131 children per 1000 births

The U.S. has no clear energy policy, leading to a dependence on oil and a military strategy to maintain control of oil

George W Bush will be inaugurated January 20, seeking to strengthen sanctions and "finish the job" his father started

Hundreds of people should come to PSU on January 16 to work for peace
