represented various peace and justice organizations.

The group consensus was the need to work toward a common goal, even though they all came from different causes. The most common cause mentioned was the need to continue to put pressure on the U.S. government to stop nuclear arms and stop its involvement in foreign affairs. But for the local issues, the main topic was the need to push for a civilian police review board. Members from Radical Women and the Anti-Prohibition League attacked the current policies saying the war on drugs was really a war on the poor and an excuse to chip away at their civil rights. This group made plans to organize future meetings and mentioned that they will attend the community meeting on August 3 at the King Community Center regarding police reform.
